First my sincere thanks to John for taking the time and effort to get my DNA up on the Ancestry site. Obviously not an easy task given our communications, but very appreciated.

Elaine thank you for the first contact and information. My tree is linked to this site and should be public. Note I am only positive of my Pruitt lineage back to James William (JW or Jim) Pruitt. At that point I have a bit of brick wall as do the cousin's I've met via ancestry researching the line. I do show JW's father as Caroll W. based on my best research to date but have not made a 100% solid connection there. I believe Caroll may be a brother to Francis Marion from an initial search which given the DNA results and my matches with Ron appears to have me at least in the right direction to making that solid leap from JW Pruitt to his parents. One of my primary purposes in having the y-dna done was hoping I could find/match with a more distant forefather and work forward to that solid connection with JW. And of course any surprises or contributions that I can make.

Overall I am relatively new to all this. Always dabbled a bit but when my father took ill (yes I waited to long) it got me jump started. The family genealogy has become a passion since his passing in Oct of 2010. As all of you I find my genealogy fascinating as I have descended from the early settlers on both coasts. Primarily Scotch Irish it appears but tied to many early colonial families, earliest in the 1630's to date and also the very first Spaniards from Mexico that made their way up the coast settling in Santa Barbara primarily while establishing the first arrivals in Los Angeles. The Spanish line married into the Pruitt line with my grandparents, Shannon Ector Pruitt and Marjorie Marie Zielke.

Michael, on the DNA, you very close match to Ron on FT at a 2 MRCA. Due to the differences in FT and Ancestry (which only used 34 of your markers) it now looks like you are more distant from Ron at 7 MRCA in our database. This is misleading because you are very close to Ron who has identical DNA with James, Paul and Norman in the group. Ron, James Paul and Norman can be said to have the standard DNA for this Family Group which goes back to an unknown ancestor probably someone back a few generations from Solomon, etc. All of you are very close on your family tree and your relatives are not distant cousins in this group. May be this will help you solve the mystery of who the common ancestor was.

John, thanks for the clarification! This is what I was hoping for (as I'm sure most due) when having the y-dna done. There are a lot of stories that have come from "cousins" in the Tex as area and hopefully I can find ways to prove them one way or another.

As further reference for my close matches, my grandfather Shannon came from the Texarkana/ New Boston area of northeastern Texas. Seems to be a rich history of the family moving around within Indian Country (Texas/Arkansas/Oklahoma) due to intermarriage with Cherokee Indians (not proven at this point) and given the history of the mid to late 1800's in the Texas territory at the time. This may be one reason I can find so few documents on the family around my great grandfather JW Pruitt born in Rusk, Texas ab. 1856. Interesting reading on the migration patterns also as the families that my Pruitt Tree married into Ramsey / Waldrop appeared to make the similar migration as reflected for Group B. Virginia, Carolina's, Georgia, Alabama, then in my case Tex as. Interesting parralels.
